home port in Bremerton, WA, in the summer of 2021. The Nimitz-class aircraft carrier, which deployed from San Diego in January, is back on patrol in the Pacific Ocean following an outbreak of coronavirus. When it transfers to Bremerton, it will enter the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard for what the Navy terms “docking planned incremental availability,” which is an extended period in dry dock for maintenance and upgrades.

Navy spokesman Lt. Travis Callaghan wouldn’t say when or whether another carrier would take the Roosevelt’s place in Coronado: “U.S. Navy long-range planners constantly evaluate whether ships, aircraft and equipment are being used effectively and efficiently. Further decisions involving changing carrier homeport assignments will be announced when appropriate.” The USS Abraham Lincoln is based here, and the USS Carl Vinson is scheduled to arrive in the summer following its own overhaul in Bremerton.

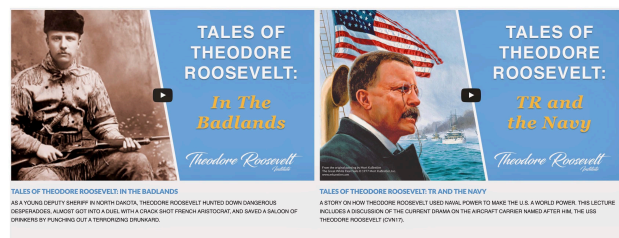
TRA Arena

Outdoors Act passes in the Senate to Support National Park Maintenance

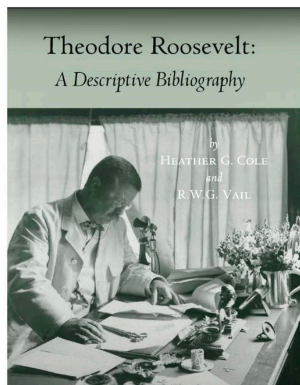

The U.S. Senate passed the Great American Outdoors Act. The bill would allocate nearly \$2 billion a year for the next five years to the National Park Service. That \$2 billion every year will address national park and public land maintenance backlogs across the nation. North Dakota alone has about \$50 million in maintenance that has been on hold. National Parks across the U.S. are facing nearly \$12 billion in maintenance backlogs. "Our



park infrastructure is at risk of being loved to death, leading to dilapidated infrastructure that can compromise the visitor experience and safety," said Sen. Steve Daines, R-Mont. North Dakota lawmakers said the bill will help the state in more ways than one. "The Great American Outdoors Act really brings us one step closer to making significant and really necessary improvements, not only at Theodore Roosevelt National Park, but also on our public lands and Native American schools," said Sen. Kevin Cramer, R-N.D. The Restore Our Parks Act included in the overall bill will help with road repairs, which make up the bulk of the state's maintenance needs.

Sen. John Hoeven, R-N.D., added, "The bill will bolster investment in our national parks' facilities and infrastructure, like the repairs that are underway on the Scenic Loop Drive in the South Unit of Theodore Roosevelt National Park." A permanent fund for land and water conservation will be created as well. The state received nearly \$2 million from that program in the 2020 fiscal year. The bill is anticipated to pass through the House of Representatives. President Donald Trump has also indicated his support and is expected to sign it.

Ceremony transferring Sagamore Hill from Theodore Roosevelt Association to National Park Service

Once again, for this issue, we have partnered with the Theodore Roosevelt Center at Dickinson State University and benefit from their financial support in digitizing material. This month we reveal an audio recording of TRA giving Sagamore Hill to NPS which occurred on July 8, 1963. Oscar S. Straus, president of the Theodore Roosevelt Association, presides over the ceremony transferring ownership of Sagamore Hill from the Theodore Roosevelt Association to the Department of the Interior and the National Park Service. Speakers include the Chair of the Sagamore Hill Committee Bertha Bartlett Benkard Rose, Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall, and Director Emeritus of the Theodore Roosevelt Association Hermann Hagedorn. Straus and Rose speak on the work the Theodore Roosevelt Association has done since its establishment, particularly the effort to restore Sagamore Hill to its condition during the presidency of Theodore Roosevelt.



Udall praises the contributions Roosevelt made in urging the nation to conserve its natural resources, looking to the good of future generations. Hagedorn reminisces about Roosevelt's character and hopes that visitors to this historic home will understand what made Roosevelt great and take that lesson to heart. Udall concludes the ceremony by assuring attendees that the National Park Service will care well for the site, and by signing the order officially establishing the Theodore Roosevelt Birthplace and Sagamore Hill National Historic Sites. Edith and Theodore Roosevelt Pine Knot Foundation

Pine Knot, the rustic retreat of Edith and President Theodore Roosevelt and their family during his presidency is nestled deep in the quiet woods of southern Albemarle County, 15 miles south of Charlottesville, VA. Edith purchased Pine Knot in 1905 as a place for "rest and repairs"; a small cottage being built for a farm worker with no electricity, plumbing, heat or interior finish, which she left unchanged, as it is still. Described as "quite the most unpretentious habitation ever owned by a president of the United States," Pine Knot uniquely exhibits the character and principles of the Roosevelts.



The property is stewarded by the Edith and Theodore Roosevelt Pine Knot Foundation, a small locally based Virginia non-profit whose Board of Directors, Docent work and most maintenance are carried out by volunteers. As the state enters Phase 2 of reopening during the COVID-19 virus, they are being permitted to open our historic site. Pine Knot was reopened June 14, 2020, but will be observing federal, state and local protocols for the COVID-19 virus and will require our visitors to do

so as well. As a wilderness site, Pine Knot is most suited to accommodate visitations that remain distanced, while offering the opportunity to enjoy the outdoors and physically and mentally replenish its visitors, just as did President Theodore Roosevelt and his family. Visitors can email for appointments. For those who have not been to Pine Knot, it is a precious gem in southern Albemarle County, just 15 miles southeast of Charlottesville. To reach the cottage, there is a wonderful tree-lined 1/4 mile walk.
