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

Dear TRA Annual Meeting Supporter,

I just want to bring you up to date on recent developments with the TRA Annual Meeting on October 23 and 24 at the National War College at Fort Leslie J. McNair. Due to the persistence of the coronavirus in the District of Columbia, city officials have continued the restrictions set in place during the summer to limit large

gatherings. They have indicated that no further change to those restrictions should be expected before the end of October. Those restrictions include for visitors from certain states to quarantine ([link to details](#)) for 14 days upon arrival in DC.

The leadership of the TRA and the National War College have concluded that the TRA Annual Meeting must now be adjusted to ensure compliance with these restrictions as they exist. This means that the focus will be on conducting the Symposium events as planned with the entire proceedings available by webcast. To the extent that they are able, the Symposium presenters and panelists will participate in person at Ft. McNair. If not, they will do so remotely.

There may be an opportunity to accommodate a very limited number of Sponsors who desire to attend the Symposium events at Ft. McNair in person. There will be two opportunities to see General Mattis: after the Symposium's last panel on Friday at a small gathering with General Mattis AND on Saturday afternoon when he is presented with the TRA award.

We make the assumption that you would like to have access to the webcast regardless and we will be providing you with information on how to access the webcast as soon as that information becomes available.

Finally, as pledged to you when we asked you to sign on to be a sponsor of this year's TRA Annual Meeting, we offer the return of your donation. Even if you should ask to have it returned, we will be sending you the link to the webcast. We are grateful for your understanding of the difficulties which the pandemic has dealt us and we sincerely appreciate your support of the Theodore Roosevelt Association and its mission to perpetuate the memory of our 26th President.

Own a Piece of History

Here is your chance to have a piece of Sagamore Hill displayed in your home or office. No, President Roosevelt's home is not for sale. However, the Copper Beech tree that stood stoically next the front entrance to his summer residence is being offered for sale. Despite extensive efforts to save it, the tree planted by TR in the 1890's has succumbed to old age and disease. But fortunately, we have been able to

The association has photographed, priced and measured 42 tree slabs. We are going to post on our website a series of slabs that will be offered for sale. Below each photo of the slab you will see a brief description that will include its measurements and price . The pricing of each piece will depend on the size, color, the quality of the grain and overall condition. We are also including a letter of provenance for each slab that will include a photograph of the tree as it stood next to the President's



The TRA had in its inventory a handwritten Theodore Roosevelt letter that had been separated completely at its envelope folds and thus in four separate pieces. Not an irrevocable loss! We have had it professionally restored by one of the best paper restorers in the country as it is an unpublished letter with terrific content. We have ensured Harvard has a high-resolution scan of the letter for posterity and scholarship purposes.

Now, we are offering the original letter to recipients of The Arena beginning with a minimum bid of \$ 1,000.00. Despite the professional restoration, the content is exceptional and thus the minimum bid is below market value.

You may bid only once, so place your maximum bid. At noon, 16 October, the highest bid will win the letter and the sale price will be 10% above the underbid. For example: the winning maximum bid was 3,000.00. The underbidder was 2500.00. The winning bidder will pay \$2750.00.

The restoration report will be included in the sale. And, this report can be provided via email before the auction's close upon request.

Payment is due by personal check by 30 October to the Theodore Roosevelt Association. Buyer will pay shipping costs and insurance for the carrier of their choice.

The proceeds will go toward TRA programs. It is an ALS (Autograph Letter Signed) dated September 25, 1889 and signed in full on Civil Service Commission stationery on which is printed Theodore Roosevelt as one of the Commissioners.

It reads as follows:

Dear Sergeant,

I would gladly do anything in my power to help you get any position you wish; but I am sorry to say, Sergeant that the Civil Service Commissioners are expressly forbidden to take any part whatever in getting the (illegible word due to paper loss) save through the regular examinations. I could not even endorse any one not even my own brother. But let me warmly advise you



as one having your welfare at heart, not (Note: TR underlined the word “not”) to try to get a government office; it is the last position in which I wish to see a young, energetic man who I think desires to succeed. It is hard to get, and hard to keep; and it spoils you for other work. This is my strong advice. Your Friend, Theodore Roosevelt*

A few months after getting home, the Theodore Roosevelt is about to deploy again

Less than three months ago, the stricken sailors of the aircraft carrier USS Theodore Roosevelt trundled off their ship in San Diego following a deployment that saw them waylaid in Guam after a COVID-19 outbreak killed one shipmate and infected roughly a quarter of the approximately 5,000 others onboard. Now, the TR is getting ready to deploy again in the coming months. Several sources from within the carrier’s community tell Navy Times that the crew has been told to expect to deploy anywhere from November to January, with a restriction-of-movement period, or ROM, taking place as soon as next month to make sure everyone is COVID-19-free before they ship out. The Navy won’t comment on the deployment’s specifics, but officials noted TR is in a phase where it must be ready to deploy on “short notice” and that “deployment resiliency” resources



and other assistance are being provided to the carrier’s crew and family members. Some community members said this week that while they had been previously told to expect back-to-back deployments ahead of TR’s homeport move to Washington state for maintenance in 2021, the harrowing cruise earlier this year makes another deployment so soon make it much more difficult. The “double pump” of the TR — sending it out on two deployments in the same 36-month readiness cycle — follows news that the carrier Dwight D. Eisenhower will be doing the same thing soon from the East Coast early next year.

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Theodore Roosevelt Island



I live in Washington, D.C., and much like most of the parents in the area—the whole country, really—my wife and I have looked for mostly outdoor activities to do with our kids since the beginning of the pandemic. Washington, D.C., and its surrounding suburbs, are home to tons of museums and monuments; there's always somewhere to go to look at some national something-or-other with some social distancing that's pretty much a 30-minute drive from us all.

Which is exactly what I did a few weeks ago. On one of those days when my kids clearly needed to get outside, I put my kids in the car and we took a drive out into the city and realized that there

was a location I'd never been before having seeing social media posts: Theodore Roosevelt Island.

In the 1930s, landscape architects transformed Mason's Island from neglected, overgrown farmland into Theodore Roosevelt Island, a memorial to America's 26th president. They conceived a "real forest" designed to mimic the natural forest that once covered the island. Today miles of trails through wooded uplands and swampy bottomlands honor the legacy of a great outdoorsman and conservationist.

The group behind the proposed Theodore Roosevelt Presidential Library has selected Norwegian architecture firm Snøhetta to design the high-profile project in western North Dakota. Snøhetta, led by founding partner Craig Dykers, beat out two other world-renowned firms, Chicago-based Studio Gang and Copenhagen-based Henning Larsen, in a final design competition held last month near the proposed site of the library in tourist town Medora, N.D. Dykers told Forum News Service



he felt "exceptional joy" to be selected for the project and said he looked forward to honoring Roosevelt's legacy by "connecting history to the future." Melani Walton, who chairs the library board's design committee and is married to billionaire Walmart heir Rob Walton, said the firm's design "captures the spirit of Theodore Roosevelt and why he came to the Badlands." The firm has in the past garnered praise and public attention for creative projects, including Europe's first underwater restaurant and several notable opera houses and libraries. The award-winning company also integrates landscape architecture, interior design, graphics, branding and product design into its operations.

The museum board also must move to acquire the 60 acres of U.S. Forest Service land eyed for the library's site -- just west of the Medora Musical's Burning Hills Amphitheater. That process could take up to a year and would include an environmental assessment with opportunities for public comment. And the board is still raising the \$100 million for construction. The 2019 Legislature authorized a \$50 million operations endowment for the library, but it's only available after private donations are raised to build the facility. CEO Ed O'Keefe (adjacent photo) declined to say how much money has been raised, beyond that the board expects the full sum to be in hand before the 2021 Legislature convenes in early January.
